

Watches and Warnings

The National Hurricane Center issues watches and warnings for specific areas of danger. Local National Weather Service offices may issues additional watches and warnings to provide detailed information on specific threats suches as severe storms, tornadoes and flash flooding.



STORM SURGE:

Life-threatening flood from rising water moving inland from the shoreline

TROPICAL STORM:

An organized system of powerful thunderstorms and a defined circulation and maximum sustained winds of 39-73 mph.

HURRICANE:

Winds that have reached a constant speed of 74 mph or above and blow a large spiral around a relatively calm center known as the "eye."

CATEGORY	130-156 MPH	Outages could last <u>weeks to</u> <u>months</u>



EXTREME SUSTAINED WINDS OF A MAJOR HURRICANE, USUALLY ASSOCIATED WITH THE EYEWALL ARE EXPECT-ED TO BEGIN WITHIN AN HOUR.


<u>ACTIONS:</u>

<u>STORM SURGE VS STORM TIDE</u>

ACCORDING TO THE NATIONAL HURRICANE CENTER, STORM SURGE IS AN ABNORMAL RISE OF WATER GENERATED BY A STORM, THIS RISE IN WATER LEVEL CAN CAUSE EXTREME FLOODING IN COASTAL AREAS PARTICULARLY WHEN STORM SURGE COINCIDES WITH NORMAL HIGH TIDE, RESULTING IN STORM TIDES REACHING UP TO 20 FEET OR MORE IN SOME CASES.





IN A DISASTER, IT MAY BE AS LONG AS 72 HOURS BEFORE FIRST RESPONDERS ARE ABLE TO ASSIST YOU. YOU SHOULD BE PREPARED TO SURVIVE FOR A **MINIMUM** OF 3 DAYS WITH YOUR OWN DISASTER SUPPLY KIT.

*TIP: It is best to use your radio and flashlight to preserve phone battery.

DOCUMENT CHECKLIST

Personal Records (birth, marriage, divorce, adoption and death certificates, Wills)

Personal Identification (passports, driver's licenses, visas, etc.)

Social Security Cards

Housing documents (property leases, deeds, mortgages, home and auto titles, etc.)



Financial documents (pay stubs, bank statements, retirement statements and safe deposit box keys and tax informaiton)

Debit and Credit Cards

☐ Medical records (prescriptions, copies of health records, copies of insurance cards, health care provider contact, etc.)

☐ Family Photos, Keepsakes, and Other Mementos






EVACUATION TIPS

BEFORE

- Know where you will go whether it is a family member's house, a shelter or hotel
- Review your primary evacuation route and have a secondary route planned just in case
- Make arrangements for your pets (pets are not allowed in most shelters)
- Seek information from local officials regarding road closures and additional emergency information
- Fill up your gas tank and have cash on hand

DURING

- Stay on offical evacuation routes (*A GPS may misdirect you to roads that are closed*)
- Tune to local radio stations for emergency information updates:

- Take your time and be patient

Tips for Talking to Children During a Disaster


- Encourage them to ask questions
- Reassure your child that they are safe
- Ask how they are feeling and share your feelings
- Be reassuring but don't make unrealistic promises

The Community Shelter at the Necaise Shelter welcomes family pets such as small domesticated animals, cats, dogs, iguanas and other small reptiles.

Pet owners are required to:

- Bring cages/kennels to house your animals
- Bring water, food, and food bowls for your animals
- Bring any medication required for your animals
- Animals must be current on all vaccinations, including the rabies vaccination and the owner must provide a copy of current vaccination records in order to house animals at the shelter.

PETS AND EVACUATIONS


Build a Kit

Here are some items to include in your pet emergency kit for your pet:

- **Food** (have at least a week of supply in an airtight container)
- Water (store a water bowl and at least a week of supply)
- Medicine and medical records
- First aid kit
- Collar with ID tag and a harness/leash
- **Travel bag, crate or sturdy carrier** (ideally one for each pet)
- Grooming items
- **Sanitation items** (pee pads, pet litter, litter box, newspaper, chlorine bleach etc.)
- A picture of you and your pet together (if you become separated from your pet, a picture helps you document ownership and assists you in identifynig your pet)
- **Familiar items** (favorite toys, treats or bedding, items to help reduce stress)

Crate Training

Traveling with a pet in a crate is always safer than having them loose in your vehicle. In addition to travel, wherever you evacuate to will most likely require your pet to be crated. If your pet is not crate trained, now is the time to do it.



Tips for Large Animals

If you have pets such as horses, goats, or pigs on your property, be sure to prepare for a disaster.

- Ensure all animals have some form of ID
- Evacuate animals earlier, whenever possible. Have primary and secondary routes
- Have vehicles and trailers needed for transporting and supporting animals ready
- Ensure evacuation location have food, water, veterinary care and handling equipment
- If you cannot evacuate, animal owners must have a back up plan to secure their animals

IF YOU ARE PLANNING TO EVACUATE TO A SHELTER OR HOTEL, CALL AHEAD TO ENSURE THEY ALLOW PETS





Many pets are separated from their owners during the chaos of a disaster. If your pet is not microchipped, it is a good idea to get your pet chipped. If you are unsure if your chip is current, take your dog to the vet to get the chip number then call the company to make sure it is upto-date. It is also a good idea to get your pet scanned regularly. Chips can move throughout the dogs body and can even fall out over time.



SENIORS AND ACCESS AND FUNCTIONAL NEEDS

Stay Informed

- Know what diasters could impact where you live and which ones would call for an evacuation or a shelter in place order
- Keep a NOAA Weather radio tuned to your local emergency station
- Monitor local tv news and radio stations for warnings about severe weather in your area

Plan for Medical Needs

- Have TWO WEEKS of medications
- Know how to power medical equipment in your home that requires electricity, in case of a power outage.
- Talk with your power company about putting you on a priority list for power restoration
- Organize and secure your prescriptions and other important medications. Keep a list of medication and dosages in your emergency kit
- Wear a medical alert tag or bracelet
- Carry printed cards or store information on your phone to inform first responders and others how to communicate with you if you have a communication disability
- If you use assistive technology, plan for how you will evacuate with them or decide if you will replace the equipment if it is lost

HAVE ELECTRONIC COPIES OF YOUR RECORDS

Create a Network

- Make sure at least one person in your network has a key to your home
- Tell your support network where you keep your emergency supplies and knows how to use lifesaving equipment or administer medicine
- Know the location and availability of more than one shelter or medical facility that can help you
- Practice you emergency plan with your support network
- Don't forget your pets! Not all shelters accept animals. Be sure someone in your networks outside of your area can help with your animals

INCLUDE OTHERS IN YOUR PLANS!

Other Important Tips

PLAN FOR NEW ENVIRONMENTS

 Your household may include children and adults who have a hard time adjusting to chaotic environments. Have a plan to help them adjust. If you have support animals, you will need extra food, water and supplies for them as well

CONSIDER TRANSPORTATION

 Plan ahead for accesible transportation needs. Ensure you have a way of getting around before, during and after a disaster

GET YOUR BENEFITS ELECTRONICALLY

 A disaster can disrupt mail service for days or even weeks. If you depend on Social Security or any other benefits, consider switching to electrionic payments if you have not.
